Executive Director's Message



FY2021-22 highlighted the incredible strengths and assets of our two staff, six instructors, 15 partners and most of all the resiliency of all our learners as we continued to provide programming during the pandemic. Through it all, our iSisters team, board of directors, funders, volunteers and collaborators, provided unwavering support that kept us energized as we continued to meet our learners' needs and the demands for quality online and in-person programs that our learners have come to trust and respect.

We focussed and adapted our programs to where women could continue to learn in a safe and positive environment despite the pandemic. Online learners were provided with laptops, some participated in evening programming while others attended condensed or expanded sessions. Our instructors provided additional 1:1 time with those women requiring assistance before and after sessions. All in all, we provided instruction to 280 women which is an increase of 117 participants over the previous year. We are so proud of each and every learner's accomplishments in spite of the many challenges they may have faced along the way.

We are pleased to report a number of major successes in the past year: Our virtual 20th Anniversary Celebration and Silent Auction, expansion of our programs to new Indigenous learners, newcomers, immigrant and refugee women. We are focussing on further developing our data management system and reporting functions. We also formed an EDI Committee that is committed to long-term meaningful change.

My heartfelt thank you to our entire Operations Team (instructors, executive assistant, bookkeeper) and our dedicated volunteers for your hard work and commitment to our learners and iSisters. Special thanks to Erin Keeley-Messier our Program Manager for leading our instructors and managing our excellent programs.

What a joy it is to work with our very talented and hard-working Board of Directors who successfully govern iSisters and who support me in my work to confidently continue the progressive work of our organization.

We are so grateful for our dedicated donors who continue to support our work. It is with your vital contributions that we have been able to assist 3640 women since iSisters inception in 2001.

Chair's Message

As iSisters acclimatizes to a post-pandemic world, we've adapted our operations to address new needs made obvious by the events of the last two years. Ensuring women and gender-diverse people have the opportunity to gain tech skills that will help them improve their circumstances remains our sharp focus. T. needed to look for work, but wasn't confident of her computer skills. Then she heard about "this amazing class from iSisters" and decided to give it a try. After attending the iSisters program, T. knows much more about her laptop and using the internet. Says T., "I can now work on MS Word and Excel spreadsheets, unlike before. I didn't think I could learn online with COVID-19 going on, but I have done so well. I would recommend iSisters to anyone who needs help with technology!" Now T. is confident in applying for jobs and expects to get work soon.

R. came to Canada as a refugee from Syria. When she arrived, R. was asked to enter her name on a computer. She was embarrassed and saddened: R. had never used a computer before. Now R. has gained essential computer experience through the iSisters program, and she is confident and equipped to help other women in her community.

J. was a busy mother living day to day, cheque to cheque, without the flexibility to plan for her future. She didn't know what to expect from iSisters but thought she would give it a try. She was thrilled by the opportunity to learn about relevant tools, skills, and connections. J. used her experience to start her own business; she is still a busy mother, but she is planning for her and her family's future.

A. was a 14 year old student from Kenya. Her mom was in Canada settling in. On her way home from church in Kenya she was gang raped. She is now in Canada with a two-year old working on her high school diploma. She was unable to read due to a reading disability and could not make out words. She is now using assistive technology to access the curriculum. Her confidence has gone way up and she is hoping to obtain her GED. She is very smart and wants to go into nursing.

A newcomer to Canada, K. had been working in healthcare and knew nothing about computers. She wanted to get work but struggled without technology skills. "Without you and your organization, I felt very isolated and mentally distressed because everything around me required technology to get in touch." Now, after attending our Career Connections program, K. applying for new positions and is optimistic about her new career. "Before your course, I did not think that I could change my career because most of my experiences are in healthcare and I thought I would have to work in this field until I retired. Now I can say that I know computers well enough to communicate with the rest of the people in our community. Your course will help lots of people to get back on their feet or change their career like me!"

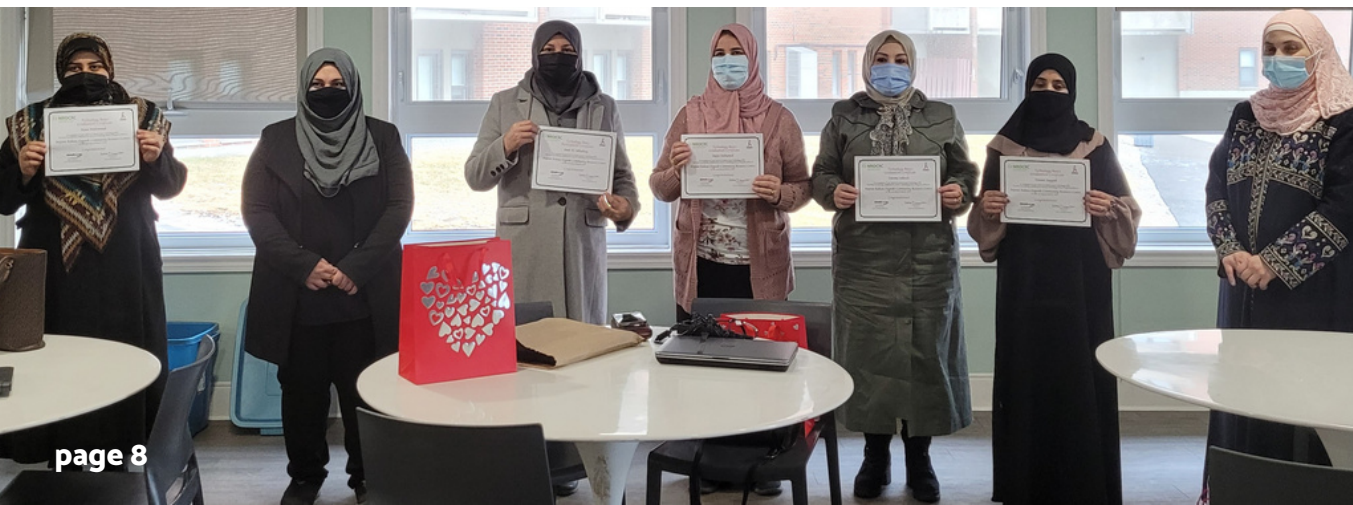
